Major Employers & Industries

Birmingham is one of the UK's most economically significant cities, contributing over £30 billion annually to the national economy. It has firmly established itself as a centre for finance, digital innovation, advanced manufacturing, healthcare, and the public sector, with a diverse and resilient employment base.

- **Finance & Professional Services:** Birmingham boasts the largest financial services sector outside London. Other notable employers in Birmingham include National Express, Cadbury (Mondelez International), Severn Trent, and Mitchells & Butlers, each supporting over 1,000 jobs in the city.

You can reach Manchester in around 1.5 hours, Leeds in just under 2 hours, Bristol in around 1.5 hours, and London in approximately 2.5 hours by car. The city's strategic location at the heart of the national motorway network makes it ideal for business travel and logistics.

Air: Birmingham Airport provides international connectivity with over 150 destinations.

Tram & Bus: Extensive West Midlands Metro and National Express bus services connect all major suburbs and city points. This connectivity boosts demand from commuters, students, and businesses alike.

These projects are reimagining Birmingham and setting the stage for future growth.

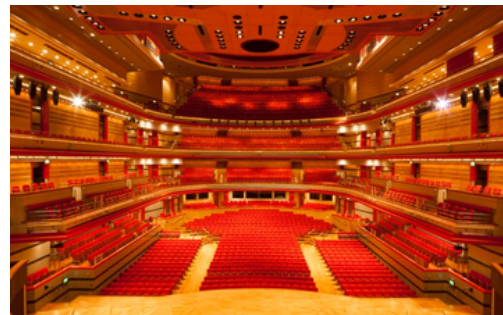


Lifestyle: Urban Energy Meets Natural Escape
